The 30th Congressional District is 22% white. With 1/5th of the population, that should indicate that the viewpoints and interests of white people should be represented in the public statements by our representative Jasmine Crockett.

Yet, when we listen to Jasmine Crockett, it is as if she doesn't see herself as the representative of white people who live in her district. She repeatedly vilifies white people as being members of the "white supremacy." It is as if she doesn't see herself as a representative of people whose skin color is different from hers.

We can understand that she won her election fair and square. Her district was specially carved out to be a "safe black district."

I would point out that race consciousness should not be part of the redistricting process. To engage in race consciousness is to disenfranchise people on the basis of their skin color.

That was originally done to create the 30th Congressional District.

The shape of the district is roughly uniform, and it doesn't appear to cross too many jurisdictional boundary lines. I think it would be better, however, if every district approximated, to the extent possible, a square so that everyone in the district had approximately the same access to the district office.

In my profession, I represent people of all races, creeds, colors, religions, and wealth holdings. I don't see them as people of a specific race. I see them as people with legal problems. I work to solve their legal problems regardless of any racial factors.

I want a congressional representative who will see her role as a representative of people of all creeds and colors. I do not think it helps to have a representative who is constantly on the attack against white people, when they compose 1/5th of her district. Something makes her think she can go on constant attacks against white people because she is politically invulnerable.

I am disenfranchised. My views do not make it to the U.S. Congress through my representative.
