Chair and Members of the Committee,

My name is Zhao Guo, and I'm proud to live in Round Rock, Texas — one of the most diverse and fastest-growing communities in the state. I'm here as an Asian American, a taxpayer, a voter, and a citizen who is deeply concerned about this midcycle redistricting process. I strongly oppose this effort.

Let's be clear: there is no constitutional requirement, no legal necessity, and no demographic urgency demanding a redraw of district lines at this time. The only change that's occurred since the 2020 redistricting cycle is that communities of color — including Asian Americans like me — have grown more visible and more politically active.

That seems to be what this process is reacting to.

The Facts:

- Between 2010 and 2020, the Asian American population in Williamson County nearly doubled, growing from 21,312 to over 40,000 residents — now representing nearly 9% of the county's population.
- In Round Rock, Asians now make up over 8% of the population, with continued growth. That's thousands of voters who want — and deserve — to be heard.
- And yet, under past maps and certainly in this redistricting conversation, our community has been treated as a statistical inconvenience rather than a political constituency.

Midcycle redistricting undermines the basic structure of representative democracy. The rules shouldn't change in the middle of the game simply because the demographics are shifting.

That's not redistricting — it's resegregating the vote.

This isn't just about Round Rock. It's about whether communities like ours — communities of color, new Americans, emerging voters — are seen as equal participants in the democratic process, or as political threats to be divided and defused.

What We Risk:

- Confusing voters with unnecessary changes to representation;
- Weakening communities of interest by splitting minority populations;
- Reinforcing a narrative that the political system only serves the party in power;
- And inviting future lawsuits that cost taxpayers time and money — just like we've seen in Alabama, Georgia, and North Carolina.

Asian Americans in Texas — and in Round Rock — are organizing, voting, running for office, and raising our families in the communities we helped build. We deserve to be kept whole, not carved apart. We deserve fair maps, not maps drawn to sideline us.

If you believe in democratic fairness, in constitutional order, and in the legitimacy of voter voice, then there's only one option: Say no to this redistricting scheme.
